# DEPARTMENT MILESTONES



## NEW FACILITY NAME ANNOUNCED

On December 3, 2024, the Indiana Department of Correction unveiled the name of the new facility under construction in Westville as the Northwest Indiana Correctional Facility. During the special event, attendees heard first-hand from two staff members who currently work at Westville Correctional Facility and the Indiana State Prison. Major Chad Cornett and Captain Adam Bootz both mentioned how they are excited for the staff-centric features the new facility will have. The new facility will have enhanced security features, increased programming opportunities, and expanded medical services to better support rehabilitation and safety.



## BODY CAMERA ROLLOUT

In 2024, the IDOC began using body-worn cameras at the Indiana State Prison, Westville Correctional Facility, Pendleton Correctional Facility, and Wabash Valley Correctional Facility. These cameras now play a key role in enhancing safety and security for both staff and the incarcerated population by promoting transparency and accountability. The agency piloted the use of these devices at Miami Correctional Facility. The feedback from staff at Miami has been overwhelmingly positive, with use-of-force incidents decreasing by 20%. While the number of assaults against staff stayed the same, their severity has notably decreased. The footage captured on the cameras has also been invaluable in responding to grievances, defending against lawsuits, and training staff on how to handle certain situations. The pilot program with Miami helped the agency develop best practices for daily use, incident recording, privacy protection, and video storage. Body-worn cameras have become an essential tool to enhance daily operations at these five facilities. The IDOC plans to deploy the body-worn cameras at its remaining facilities in 2025.

# DEPARTMENT MILESTONES

## MICRO MARKETS LAUNCHED

With many of IDOC's facilities located in rural areas with limited dining options nearby and essential security screening procedures taking time out of an employee's lunch break, the department collaborated with food vendors to install self-serve Micro Markets. Staff can purchase various items including snacks, drinks, coffee, sandwiches, and



salads. The IDOC wanted to make sure staff had health-conscious options beyond traditional vending machine items. Staff are able to create an account and add money to their account for future purchases. This adds to the convenience of the experience so staff can avoid bringing cash or other forms of payment into secure areas. The Micro Markets are monitored electronically by their vendors who re-stock the market and accessible to staff in secure areas of each facility.

## ERO GAMES RESTARTED

After a long hiatus, the IDOC revived the Emergency Response Operations (ERO) Skills Competition. Emergency Squad Teams from 11 facilities and the agency's SERT team competed in a day of friendly competition and team-building activities. Some events tested strength and endurance like the One-Mile Run, Truck Pull, and Tug-of-War. Other events mimicked rescue operations the teams would perform in facilities like the stretcher relay. Individual awards were handed out along with the overall team prize going to Wabash Valley Correctional Facility.



## 6 FACILITIES RE-ACCREDITED BY ACA

In 2024, six IDOC facilities earned their re-accreditation from the American Correctional Association: Indiana State Prison, Indiana Women's Prison, Pendleton Correctional Facility, Plainfield Correctional Facility, Rockville Correctional Facility, and Wabash Valley Correctional Facility. The process of re-accreditation involves a comprehensive series of reviews, evaluations, and audits over a three-year period, ensuring that every aspect of facility operations meets the highest standards in both mandatory and non-mandatory standards. This achievement reflects our continued commitment to safety, security, and rehabilitation. Congratulations to all of the staff whose hard work and dedication makes a difference every day.

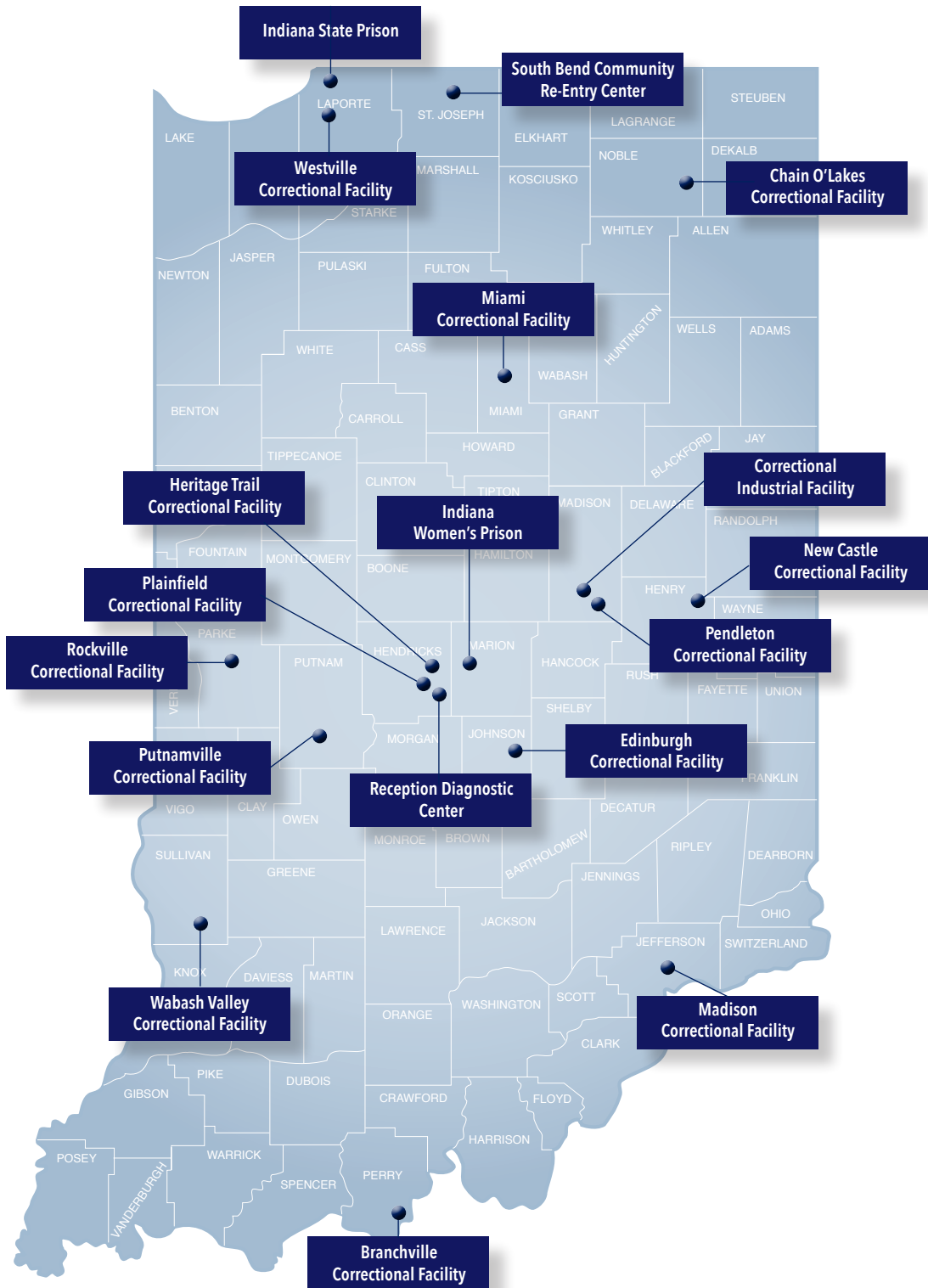
# LEGISLATIVE UPDATE



## DRONE LEGISLATION PASSED

On July 1, 2024, Senate Enrolled Act 182 took effect, making it a crime (up to a Level 6 felony) for someone to use an unmanned aircraft, including drones, to intentionally obstruct or interfere with a correctional officer's duties at a state correctional facility. Additionally, the law specifies that using a drone to transport contraband into a correctional facility is considered trafficking, an offense that carries a penalty of up to four years in prison and a fine of up to \$10,000.

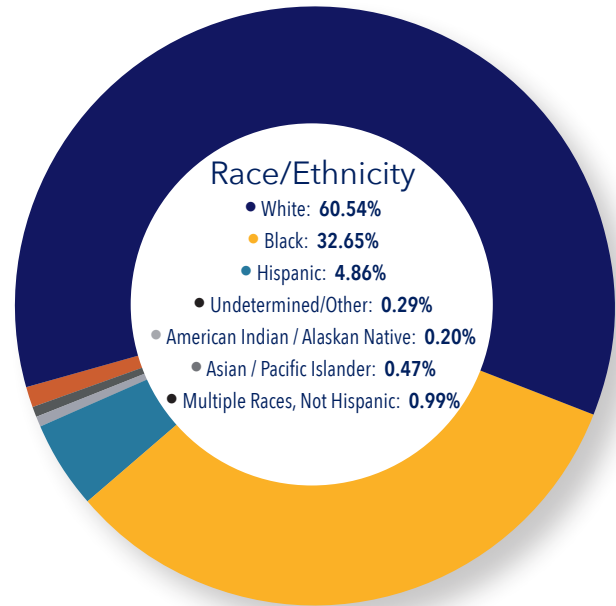

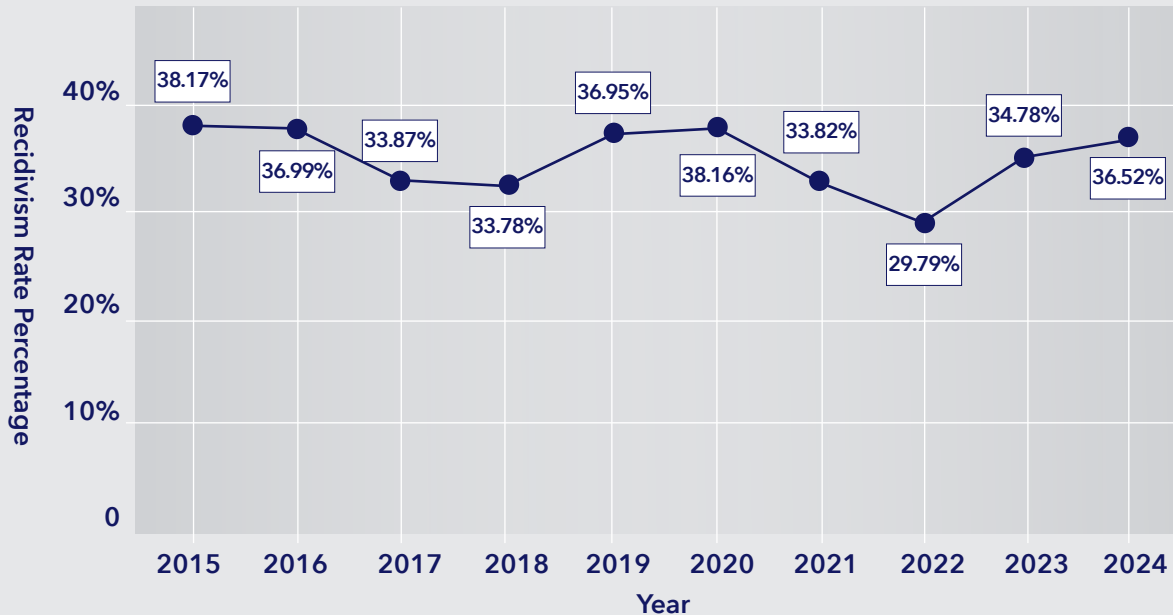

## BRANCHVILLE CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

In 2024, Branchville Correctional Facility's K9 team played a crucial role in locating a missing 3-year-old in Perry County who had wandered away from a vehicle while the family was working on a farm in a nearby area. K9's Doc, Dixie, and their handlers were dispatched to assist the other agencies responding to the emergency. The child was located within four hours of the initial call. BCF's emergency teams are proud to aid other partner agencies and serve their community outside the walls of the facility.



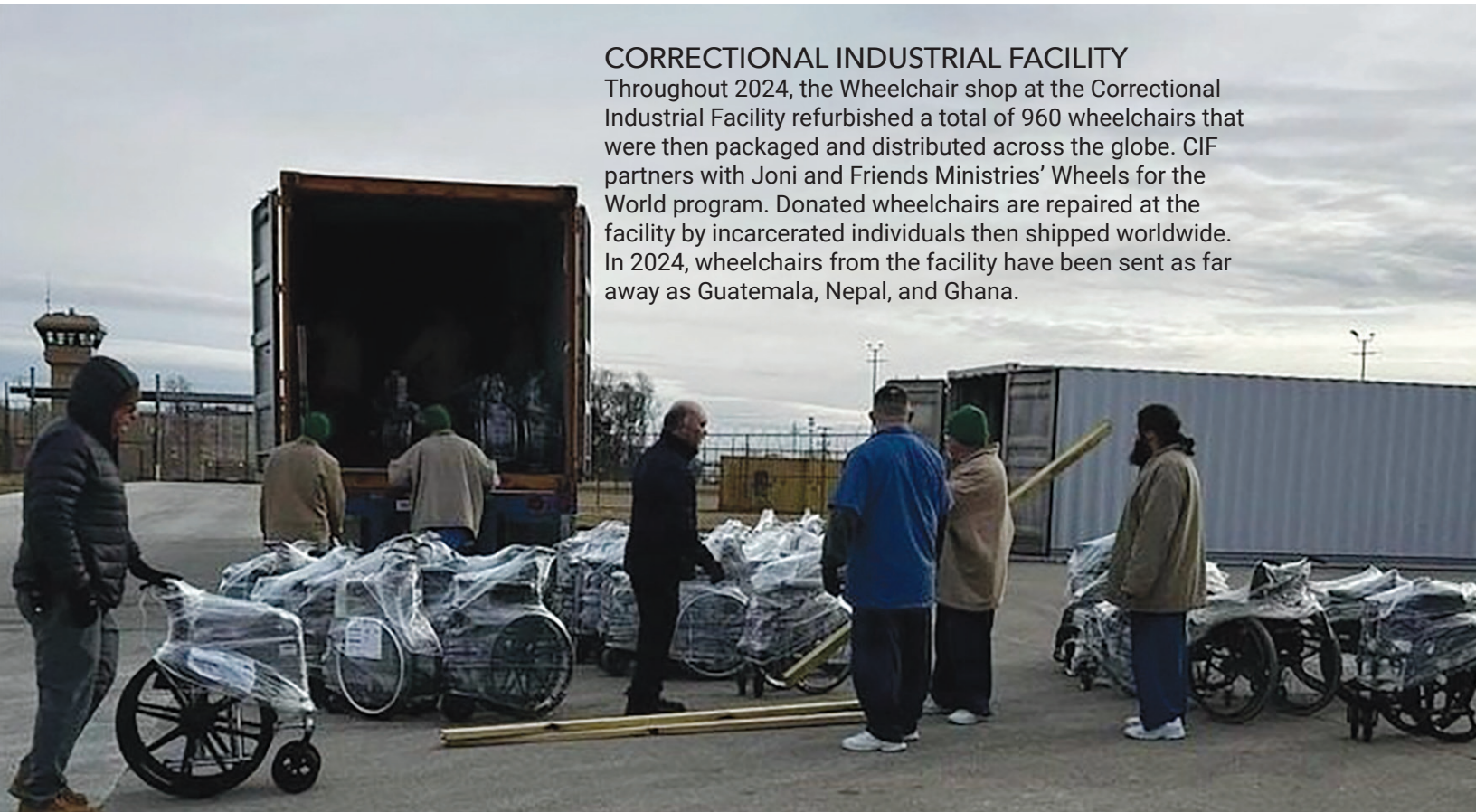
## CHAIN O' LAKES COMMUNITY REENTRY CENTER

In 2024, Chain O' Lakes Community Reentry Center adopted a 6-mile stretch of State Road 9 in Noble County. Residents of the center volunteered to participate in the initial cleanup gathering 43 bags of trash from just one side of the road. Many residents expressed that it was a rewarding experience to engage and contribute to their community beautifying the roadside near the facility. The effort fosters a sense of camaraderie and pride among participants. Warden Charles Bowen emphasizes the importance of such initiatives in promoting environmental awareness and sustaining the natural beauty of their surroundings. The COLCRC's commitment to maintaining their adopted stretch of highway inspires collective action making a tangible difference.

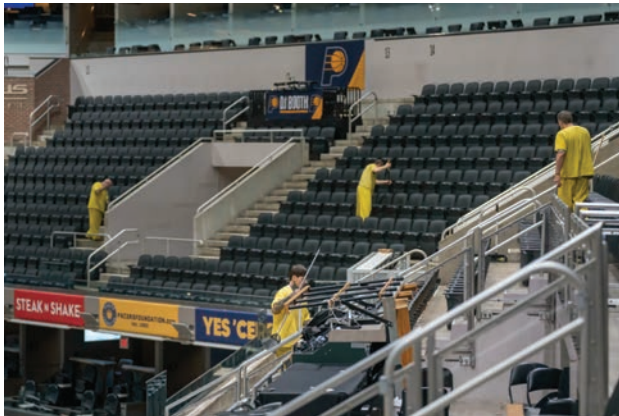
## CORRECTIONAL INDUSTRIAL FACILITY

Throughout 2024, the Wheelchair shop at the Correctional Industrial Facility refurbished a total of 960 wheelchairs that were then packaged and distributed across the globe. CIF partners with Joni and Friends Ministries' Wheels for the World program. Donated wheelchairs are repaired at the facility by incarcerated individuals then shipped worldwide. In 2024, wheelchairs from the facility have been sent as far away as Guatemala, Nepal, and Ghana.



## EDINBURGH CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

Edinburgh Correctional Facility continued its strong partnership with Pacers Sports and Entertainment in 2024. Incarcerated work crews from the facility work behind the scenes after every event at Gainbridge Fieldhouse resetting the floor for the next day's events. This includes installation and disassembly of the basketball floor for the Indiana Pacers and Fever plus prepping the venue for other events like nationally touring musical acts.

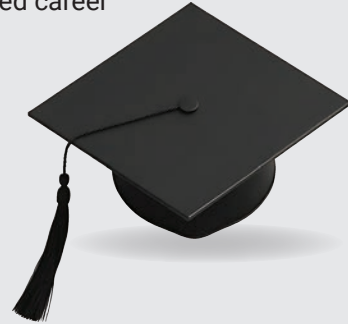


# ADULT FACILITY HIGHLIGHTS



## HERITAGE TRAIL CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

In a collaborative effort with Ivy Tech, 49 individuals received their GED and 272 were awarded career technical education certificates.



## INDIANA STATE PRISON

In the summer of 2024, Cops Cycling for Survivors made a stop at the Indiana State Prison to honor recently fallen staff from the facility. This year the ride-along vehicle paid tribute to ISP Maintenance Foreman Mike Keel who died from injuries sustained after he was assaulted by an incarcerated individual in 2023. The group of cyclists met in front of facility then honored the fallen by reading their names and taking part in a brief memorial event.



# ADULT FACILITY HIGHLIGHTS



## INDIANA WOMEN'S PRISON

The Indiana Women's Prison hosted an Olympic-themed Kids Camp in honor of the 2024 Olympics in Paris, France. This event is designed to bring children of incarcerated women together with their moms for a day of connection and joy with a variety of games and activities. The camp featured a flameless torch lighting ceremony, and they even had their own replica of the Eiffel Tower. Kids and their moms enjoyed basketball, cart races, corn hole, and obstacle courses. IWP staff are committed to making special events like this possible to break the mold of a child's traditional visit to a correctional facility. This event can create lasting memories and also reinforce the bonds between mothers and their children.



## MADISON CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

In 2024, Ivy Tech Community College and Madison Correctional Facility were proud to celebrate the successful graduation of about 90 incarcerated women. The women participated in a range of programs and educational classes, including earning their GED, getting certifications in trades such as welding, and becoming an MSSC Certified Production Technician, furthering them on their path to a successful re-entry.

# ADULT FACILITY HIGHLIGHTS



## MIAMI CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

In August 2024, Miami Correctional Facility partnered with Book Pillows of Hope to produce pillows using PLUS Program volunteers. The Wabash Presbyterian Church Women's group and Book Pillows of Hope provides all of the equipment and supplies. The nonprofit donates pillows and books to children distributing them through police, and fire departments, schools, and Indianapolis hospitals after the children have been involved in a traumatic situation.



## NEW CASTLE CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

New Castle Correctional Facility provided a work crew to help with initial cleanup efforts after an EF3 tornado struck Winchester in March 2024. The results of this storm left the town in shambles, including several restaurants, stores, and homes being destroyed. The 11 incarcerated workers and three staff supervisors were honored to provide immediate assistance to those in need.

# ADULT FACILITY HIGHLIGHTS

## PENDLETON CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

Over 100 Incarcerated individuals at Pendleton Correctional Facility helped hand pack over 3,200 packages for incarcerated people at other correctional facilities in partnership with the Christmas Behind Bars organization. This event provided an opportunity for the incarcerated individuals to work alongside volunteers from various outside communities on a common goal of helping enrich the lives of others who find themselves incarcerated. The care packages contained an assortment of snacks, hygiene items, and inspirational messages. Christmas Behind Bars is an Indiana-based non-profit founded by a formerly incarcerated individual from the facility.



## PLAINFIELD CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

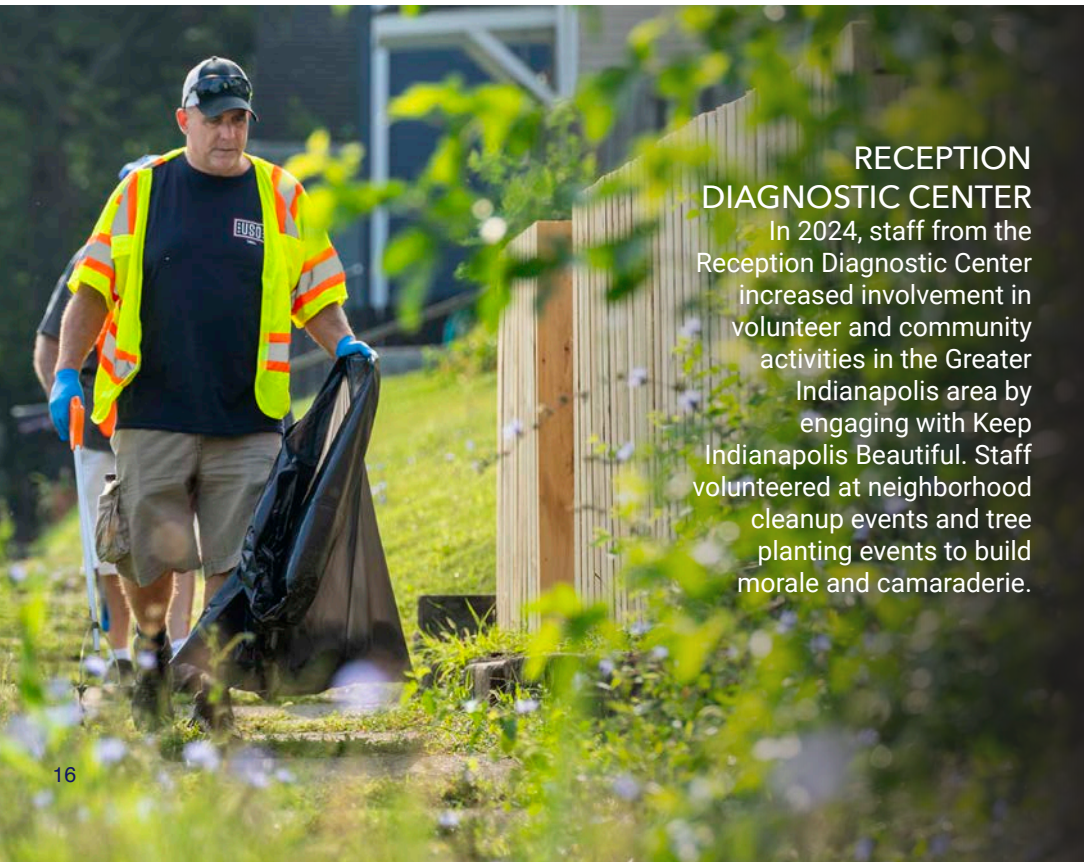
Plainfield Correctional Facility was able to help make approximately 300 pans of dressing for the Mozel Sanders Foundation in Indianapolis to serve in their annual Thanksgiving Day dinner in Indianapolis. The dinner fed nearly 10,000 people, and the incarcerated population and the correctional staff at Plainfield were excited to do their part for the holiday meal.



# ADULT FACILITY HIGHLIGHTS



**PUTNAMVILLE  
CORRECTIONAL FACILITY**  
Putnamville Correctional Facility hosted the Aces competition, a unique multi-week cooking competition in partnership with the IDOC's food vendor Aramark and their IN2Work program, which teaches incarcerated individuals food service skills. The competition included three rounds with appetizers, entrées, and desserts with incarcerated individuals competing against Aramark corporate's head chef. One incarcerated individual even returned to the facility days after his release to compete in the final round of the competition. This individual proceeded to win the competition, defeating Aramark's chef.



**RECEPTION  
DIAGNOSTIC CENTER**  
In 2024, staff from the Reception Diagnostic Center increased involvement in volunteer and community activities in the Greater Indianapolis area by engaging with Keep Indianapolis Beautiful. Staff volunteered at neighborhood cleanup events and tree planting events to build morale and camaraderie.



# ADULT FACILITY HIGHLIGHTS



## ROCKVILLE CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

Rockville Correctional Facility continued its work to support the local community. The annual Veterans Day tradition, the 18th Annual Field of Flags Event, was marked by a sea of fluttering flags, each representing the sacrifice and dedication of those who have served. Attendees gathered in solemn reflection, along with the IDOC's Honor Guard. A total of \$1,780 in donations were collected from the facility and the local community for the Indiana Veterans Home in West Lafayette. Staff also participated in Trick or Treat Around the Square, handing out 181 pounds of candy that had been donated by staff.

## SOUTH BEND COMMUNITY RE-ENTRY CENTER

Residents of the South Bend Community Re-Entry Center expanded the scope of the Cuts and Connections program. Residents who have their barbering license provide haircuts for at-risk young men at community centers on a weekly basis. In 2024, the program expanded to centers in Elkhart County. Other residents are able to participate by preparing a meal to compliment the experience. Residents are able to connect with and provide positive mentorship to the youth.

## WABASH VALLEY CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

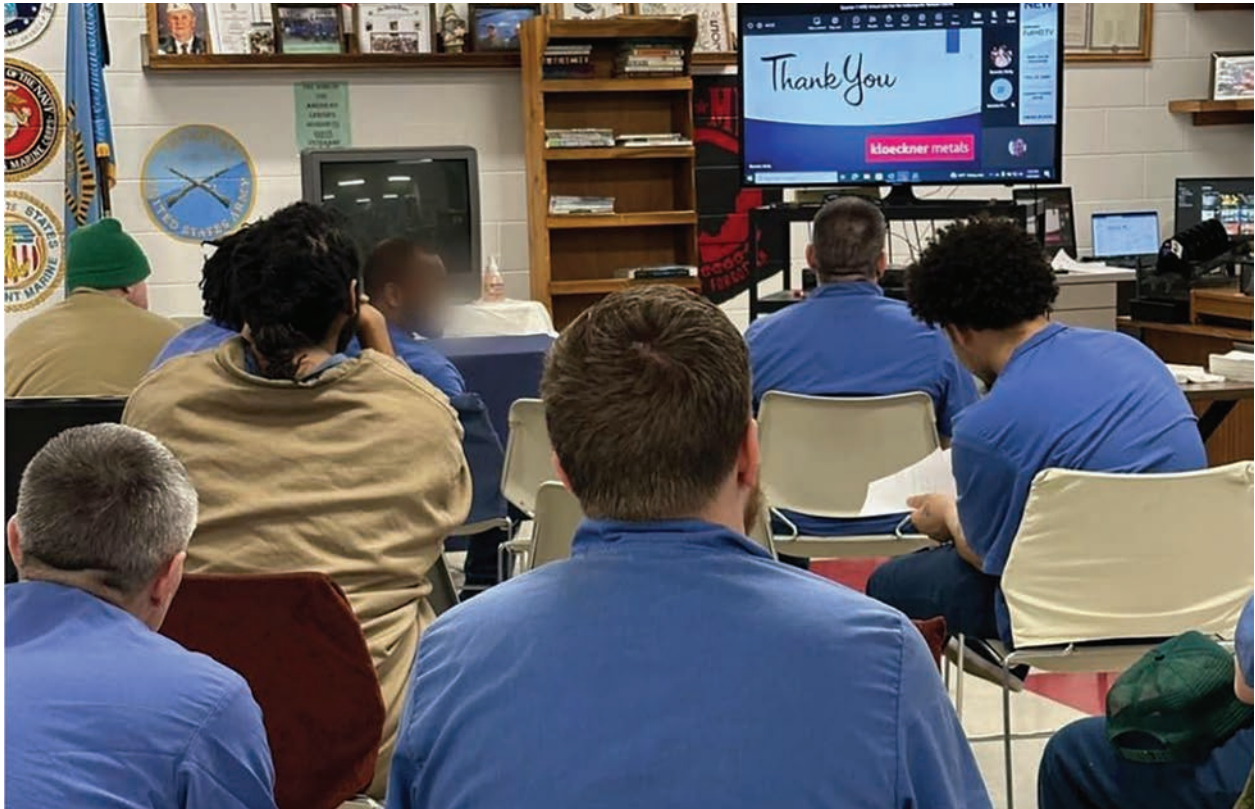
Wabash Valley Correctional Facility's Community Garden Team was honored by receiving the Governor's Public Service Award. The facility's community garden produces tens of thousands of pounds of produce for nearby food pantries each year. In 2024, the garden donated over 32,000 pounds of produce.

## WESTVILLE CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

In 2024, Westville Correctional Facility was able to host some unique sporting events to help the incarcerated population expand their team building skills while having fun. In July, Alumni from Notre Dame's baseball team played against a team of incarcerated individuals. The facility squeaked out a 9-7 win. Later that summer, Cup of Cold Water Ministries visited hosting a double header softball game. Finally, in more typical Indiana tradition, the facility hosted Inside the Lines, a program featuring a 3-on-3 basketball tournament that also teaches accompanying social skills promoting camaraderie and sportsmanship.



# DIVISION OF PROGRAMS & REENTRY READINESS



## ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- New staff-focused reentry simulations were introduced.
- Juvenile and Adult Education were combined to form an Education Division to better streamline processes.
- In 2024, HIRE more than doubled the amount of pre-release employment placements when compared to 2023.
- A total of 2.14 million days of CPCT (*Case Plan Credit Time*) was awarded, resulting in a savings of \$26 million dollars.

# DIVISION OF PROGRAMS & REENTRY READINESS

## COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS

The Community Corrections Division oversaw approximately \$72.5 million in Community Corrections Justice Reinvestment grant funding, which was awarded to over 200 agencies in 89 counties. Grant funding is available to counties for the establishment and operation of Community Corrections programs and Court Recidivism Reduction Programs. Supplemental grant funding is also available to Probation Departments, Pre-Trial Services Programs, Prosecutor’s Diversion Programs, and Jail Treatment Programs. The division provided training and technical assistance to grantees, ensuring that counties were spending grant funds appropriately while following evidence-based practices.

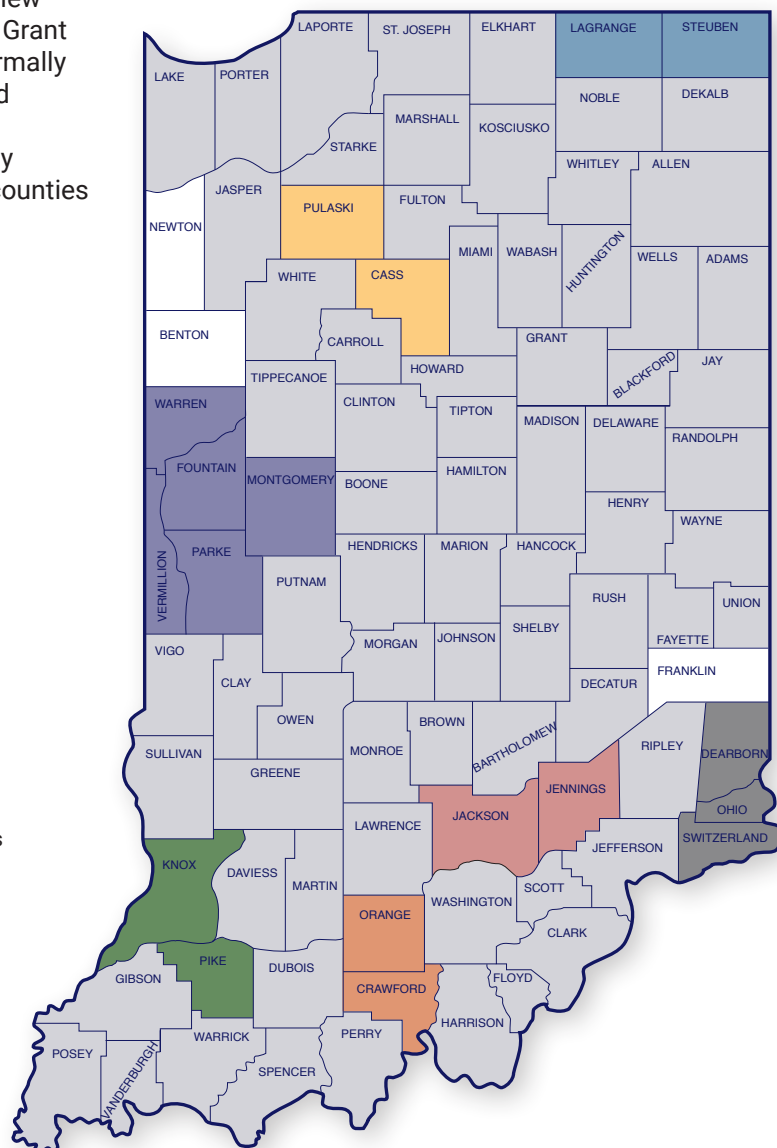
The Community Corrections Division received national recognition in December 2024 regarding work that is being done as a part of the division’s Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) grant project. The division has been partnering with University of Cincinnati’s Corrections Institute (UCCI) for the last four years to evaluate community corrections agencies on their adherence to following evidence-based practices using University of Cincinnati’s Correctional Program Checklist-Community Supervision Agency (CPC-CSA) assessment tool. With the baseline data, the Division has an understanding of where additional training and guidance may be needed, which will be a future focus.

The Community Corrections Division established a diverse committee to review and revise the Community Corrections Grant Funding Formula which hadn’t been formally reviewed in over 15 years. The updated formula will ensure that grant funding determinations are fair and consistently applied statewide, while incentivizing counties to divert low level felons to community supervision.

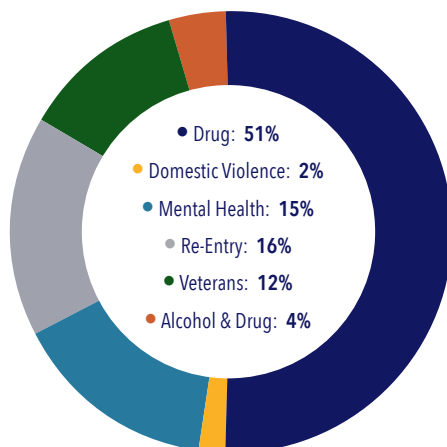

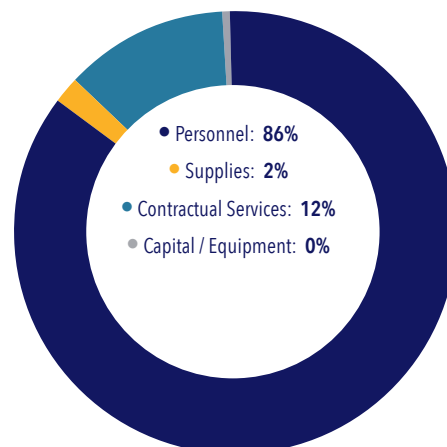

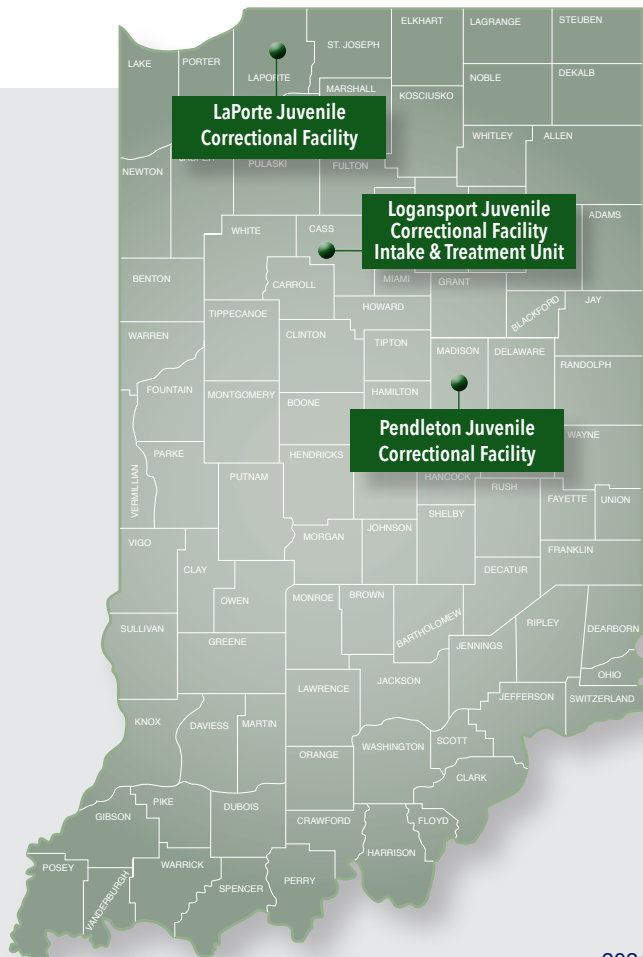

# JUVENILE FACILITY HIGHLIGHTS

## LAPORTE JUVENILE CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

In May, the LaPorte Juvenile Correctional Facility hosted a family day event for the youth and their families. They were able to speak with teachers, counselors, and other staff during the event. Activities were also available, like basketball and card games. The event also included a cookout so the youth and their families could eat a meal together.



## LOGANSPORT JUVENILE CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

New ADA-compliant handrails were installed at Logansport Juvenile Correctional Facility in July. The handrails were the last metal fabrication project by Indiana State Prison's Mike Keel. Keel tragically passed away in 2023 after he was assaulted by an incarcerated individual.

## PENDLETON JUVENILE CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

In 2024, PNJ students were able to earn 18 diplomas (15 Core 40, 2 General, 1 Certificate of Completion). Additionally, 11 students earned their GED, and 11 others completed and passed the ASVAB test.

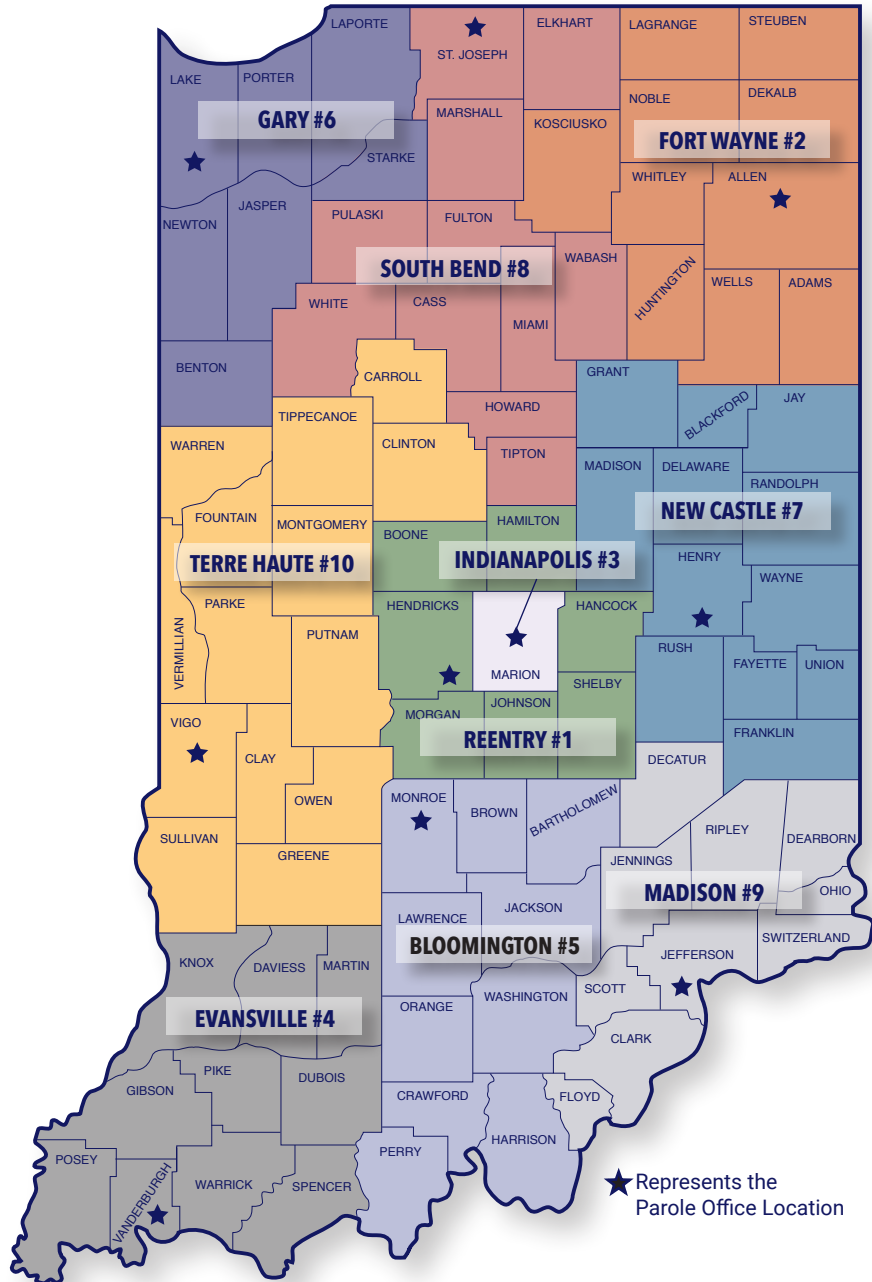

## ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In 2024, parole was able to distribute emergency kits, fire extinguishers, and weapon safety boxes for agent vehicles to better serve our communities. To further safety measures, the Dispatch IDACS Operation Center launched an internal emergency phone notification system for staff in the field. Safety ID cards were also provided for staff wishing to carry one in case of emergency situations.

# DIVISION OF WORKFORCE ENGAGEMENT




Mission Alliance trainings kicked off to help bring staff together from the Indiana State Prison and Westville Correctional Facility before construction is complete on the new facility. This early engagement helps team members get to know their future co-workers and start building strong working relationships. Training will continue through 2025 and 2026, with evolving lesson plans and curriculum that will focus more on specialized topics as the agency moves closer to the facility's opening.



In 2024, the IDOC partnered with The Carden Group, to help achieve a priority of strengthening our team. TCG has offered similar guidance and resources to various government agencies including Idaho Department of Correction and the Missouri Department of Corrections. As part of this partnership, TCG worked hand-in-hand with the IDOC to conduct a workforce assessment aimed at understanding the current environment and developing resources to achieve the following purpose and goals.

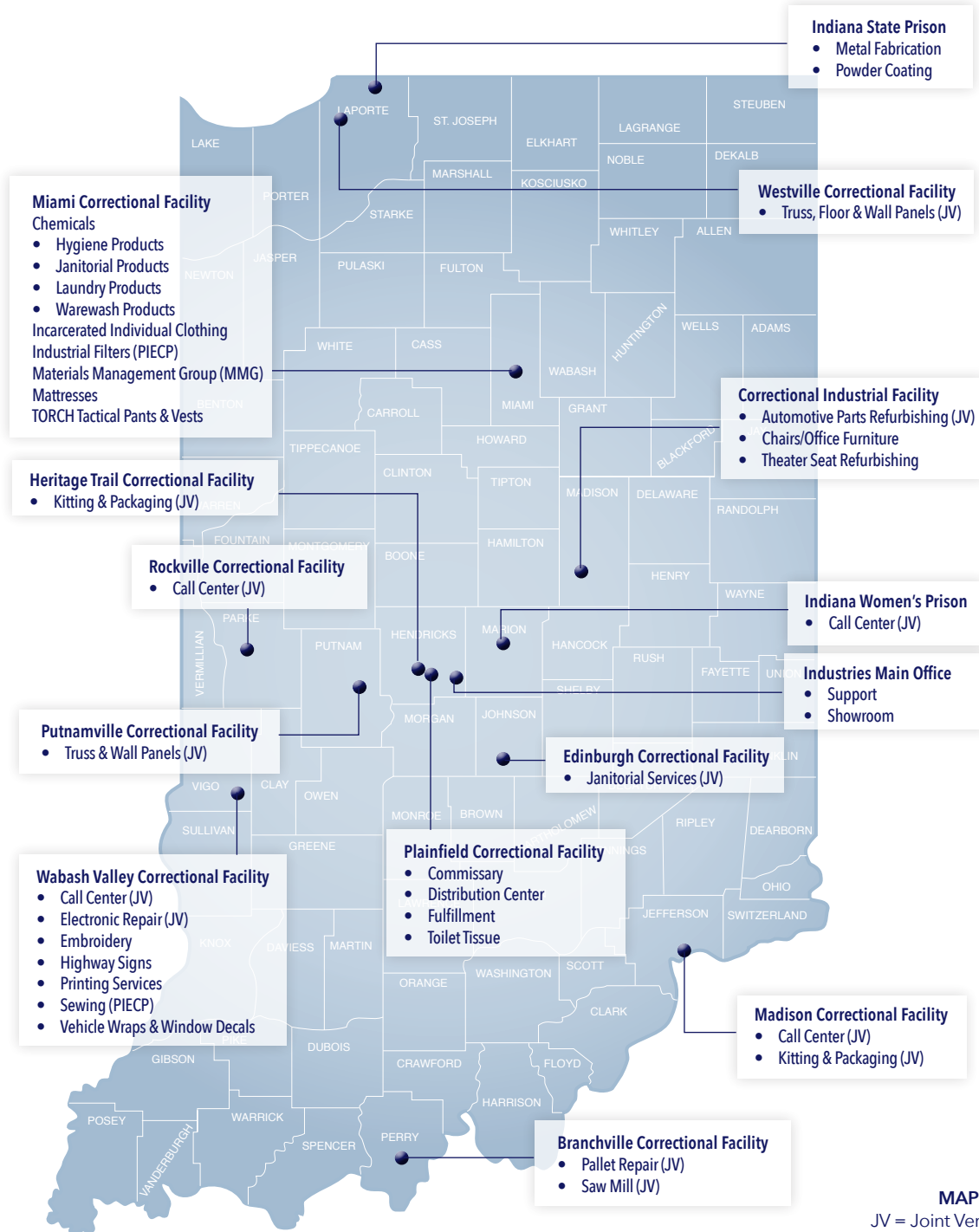

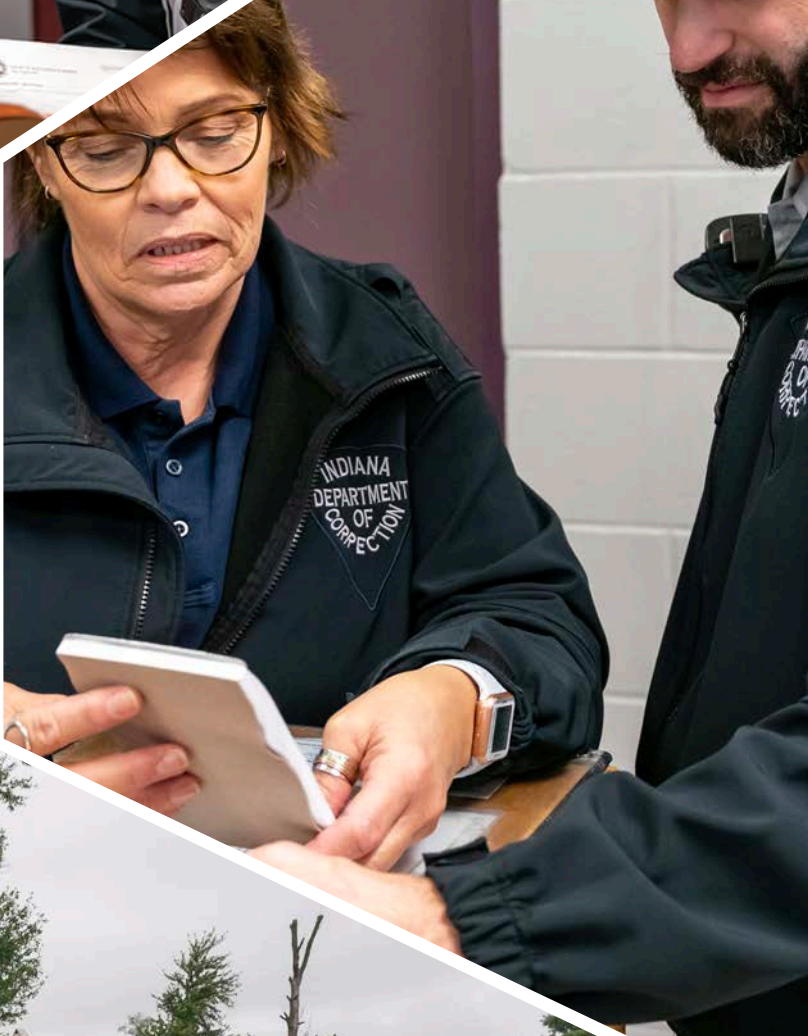
